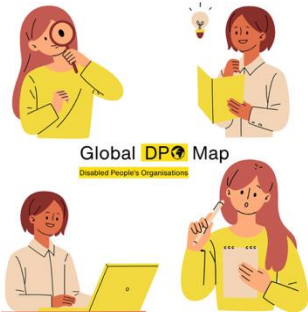
This leaflet helps you decide if you want to take part in our research.

You might need help to understand it.

What is this project about?



We are Anna Landre and Catherine Holloway.



We are **researchers** at UCL. **Researchers** find out things about the world.



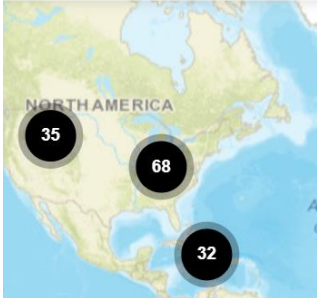
We are doing research about **Organisations of Persons with Disabilities**.

We call these **OPDs** for short.



OPDs are organisations that are run by people with disabilities.

Why are OPDs important?



OPDs are important for disabled people around the world.



But it can be hard for OPDs to connect with other organisations.

It can be hard for OPDs to show others what they do.



For example, many OPDs are busy.

They do not have time to put new information on their websites.



This means people cannot find out about the important work that OPDs do.

What are we doing with OPDs?



We want to make it easier for OPDs to find each other.

And we want to make it easier for disabled people to find OPDs.



Our research will:

- look at the best ways to do this
- collect information about OPDs
- add OPDs to our world map.



We want to find out what you think about our research.

We want to know what you find hard in your OPD work.



We want to do this in a **survey**.

A **survey** is a list of questions.

To say thank you, we will give you a voucher for taking part.

Do I have to take part?



No. You do not have to take part in this research.



You can change your mind any time.

You do not have to tell us why.

You can keep the voucher.



Before you do the survey we will check to make sure you are happy to take part.

We will answer your questions.



If you change your mind up to 1 week after the research starts, we will delete all the information you give us.

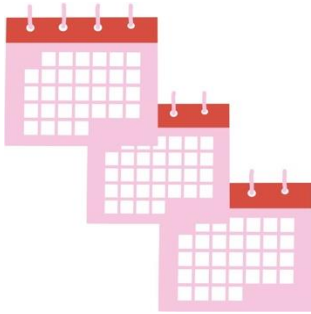
We call this **data**.

Good and bad things about taking part



We think this research will help disabled people around the world.

It will make things easier for OPDs.



But this will take time.

Good things will not happen straight away.



This research asks you to share information about OPDs.

You should only tell us information you are happy to share.



You might get upset doing the survey.

If you do, you can stop.

Or you can tell us how you feel.

What if something goes wrong?



Please tell us straight away if you are not happy.

You do not have to answer any questions you do not want to.



You can stop doing the research at any time.

You can keep the voucher even if you stop the research.



We do not want you to tell us anything that will make you upset.



Please only tell us things you are happy to share.

Will you keep my answers private?



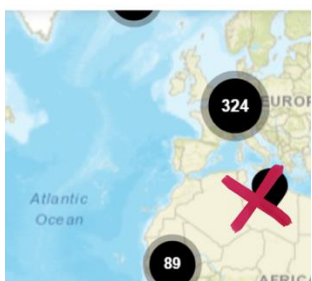
We will share the information from your survey on the OPD map.



You do not have to answer all the questions in the survey.

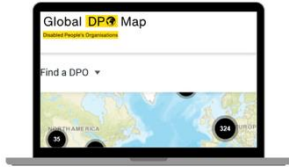


If you change your mind, just tell us.



We will take your OPD off the map.

How will you share what you learn?

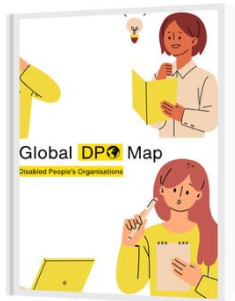


We will put the OPD map on the internet so everyone can see it.



We will share what we find out:

- In research reports and events about disability, health and technology.



- on our website and the websites of organisations we work with.



- on blogs, social media and in the news.

How do you keep my information safe?



The law says we can use **personal data** for work that is good for the public.

Personal data is information about you that says who you are.



The law says we can use information about disability for research.

We will take out your name and other personal data if we can.



In this research we use

- your name
- email address
- your full address
- information about your disability.
